


It is the financial capital of the US since it is home to the nation's stock market, Wall Street, and the One World Trade Center. It is also the home of the Headquarters of the United Nations.

# EMPIRE STATE BUILDING



The Empire State Building is highest place in the city. It was built in 1931.

It has 102° floors and at the 102° floor there is an observatory which allow to see a 100 km far.

# CENTRAL PARK



Designed in 1858, it is composed of woods, gardens and ponds.

The park is frequented by both tourists and New Yorkers, who often go with the family.

In this area there are also skating rinks, fountains, bridges and educational centers.

#### **BROOKLYN**



The Brooklyn Bridge was built from 1869 to 1883. The Brooklyn Bridge is one of the oldest suspension bridges in the United States. It is 1,825 meters long.



The bridge goes over the East River. It connects the New York City boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn. It is one of the leading landmarks of New York City.



When the Brooklyn Bridge was finished in 1883, New Yorkers feared it would collapse in no time. To convince them of the stability of the work, the great circus P.T. Barnum crossed it with 21 elephants. Back to the map

#### WALL STREET



Wall Street is a street in Lower Manhattan, New York City. It runs east from Broadway to South Street on the East River and through the Financial District. It is home to the New York Stock Exchange, the world's largest stock exchange and Federal Hall. Back to the map

# GRAND CENTRAL STATION

Trains at Grand Central go to northern suburbs of New York. One of the subway trains from Grand Central goes straight to Times Square and the Port Authority Bus Terminal, where people can catch buses that go through the Lincoln Tunnel to New Jersey. With a change of trains, they can go instead to Penn Station, another large train station in Manhattan, which has long-distance Amtrak trains to other big cities in the U.S., and other trains to suburbs in New Jersey.

# TIME SQUARE



Times Square is a section of Manhattan, New York City. It is a major center for tourism, show business and commerce. The square is at the meeting point of Broadway, Seventh Avenue and 42nd street.



It is named for the New York Times which formerly had its main building there. One of the biggest stations in the New York City Subway system is under Times Square. It is one of the most famous sights of New York



The team to win they trow the ball into a hoop or "busket".




#### CHINATOWN




Flushing is a neighborhood in the Queens borough of New York City. Flushing is the largest urban center in New York. New York's second-biggest Chinatown is there.
